Biographical Note

The Robinsons were a Quaker family of merchants and farmers, who first emigrated to Rhode Island in 1675. Thomas R. Robinson, of the fourth generation in Rhode Island, emigrated to Vergennes, Vermont in 1792. In 1793,he moved his family onto the farm now known as Rokeby in Ferrisburgh, Vermont, which had been purchased by his brother, William. Four generations of Robinsons lived continuously at Rokeby until 1961 when the last family member died and, not having direct heirs, left the site to the Rowland E. Robinson Memorial Association to be operated as a museum. Members of the Robinson family were successful farmers with saw, grist, and fulling mills in addition to crops of fruit and grains, a lucrative flock of Merino sheep during the first half of the 19th century, and, eventually, a dairy herd from which Rokeby butter was produced. The Robinsons were also abolitionists, social activists, artists, and writers. Rokeby was designated a National Historic Landmark as a documented site on the Underground Railroad in 1997.

Scope and Content

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Legal Documents and Genealogies is organized into three series. Land records consists of deeds for the Robinson property, including mill sites, summaries, and diagrams. Genealogies cover the Robinsons and some of the families to whom they were related by marriage. Wills, estates, and inventories includes wills, probate records, and inventories for various members of the Robinsonfamily as well as of other families.

II. Rokeby Farm and Household Records

Biographical Note

Scope and Content

Rokeby Farm and Household Records includes account books, loose receipts and accounts, bills of sale and insurance policies from 1810 to 1961. The farm receipts provide information regarding the specific crops grown and animals kept on the farm, including the original bill of sale for the purchase of Merino sheep in 1810. The series includes the contents of Rowland T. Robinson's leather billfolds and notebook, which contained receipts and promissory notes, 1811-1900.

Biograhical Notes

Thomas Richardson Robinson (1761-1851) emigrated to Vermont in 1792. The son of "Quaker Tom" and Sarah Richardson Robinson of Newport, Rhode Island, and brother of William T. Robinson, who in 1793 purchased the property that became Rokeby. Thomas was a successful businessman and farmer who operated saw, grist, and fulling mills on the nearby Lewis Creek. William deeded the property to him in 1801; Thomas was one of the first in America to import Merino sheep from Spain (1810). He married Jemima Fish in 1787; their childrenwere Abigail and Rowland Thomas. This collection contains Thomas Richardson Robinson's account books and school work.

George Gilpin Robinson (1825-1894), son of Rowland Thomas and Rachel Gilpin Robinson, brother of Rowland Evans Robinson. George had early training as a printer, but settled at Rokeby to manage the farm for the rest of his life. He never married, was Ferrisburgh town clerk and a member of the Vergennes City Band, and served a term as representative in the Vermont legislature. George's will and some notes are in this collection.

Ann King Robinson Minturn (1827-1917), daughter of Rowland Thomas and Rachel Gilpin Robinson, sister of Rowland Evans. Ann attended school in Ferrisburgh, married Lloyd Minturn in 1848. They had three children, lived in New York State and Massachusetts before returning to Ferrisburgh in 1872 when Lloyd became ill; he died the following year. Ann maintained a dairy farm and orchard in Shoreham, Vermont from 1880 until her death in 1917. Ann Minturn's notes and compostiions are in this collection

Rachael Robinson Elmer (1878-1919), daughter of Ann Stevens and Rowland Evans Robinson. She was artictically talented, studied art by correspondence course, at Goddard Seminary in Barre, Vermont, and later at the Art Students League in New York City. She had a career in New York as an illustrator, primarily of children's books. Rachael married Robert F. Elmer, a banker, in 1911; she died in 1919, a victim of the Spanish flu epidemic. She began to spell her name with an a, Rachael, as an adult. Robert F. Elmer (1878-1926), husband of Rachael Robinson Elmer was a New York City banker. He married Rachael in 1911; they had no children. Rachael's papers consist of school compositions, report cards, and scrapbooks. Robert's papers are his journals.

Mary Robinson Perkins (1884-1931) was the third child of Rowland Evans and Ann Stevens Robinson. She attended the Goddard Seminary in Barre, Vermont, from 1901 to 1903, when she graduated as the valedictorian of her class. After graduation Mary entered the University of Vermont in Burlington to pursue her studies. She graduated from the University of Vermont in 1910. May was a talented artist and pursued a career as a botanical artist and illustrator at the Department of Agriculture. She married Llewellyn Rood Perkins, a Middlebury College professor, at her family's home in 1912. The couple had two children, Llewellyn Robinson Perkins, born in 1914. A daughter, Ann, was born later. Mary died in 1931 while the family was living in California. Her papers consist primarily of school work and books, from her years at both Goddard Seminary and the University of Vermont along with some accounts and a diary from 1900.

Scope and Content

Robinson Family Personal Papers contains the miscellaneous personal papers (excluding correspondence, which forms its own separate collection) of several members of the Robinson family and household, including the following: Thomas Richardson Robinson (1761-1851), George Gilpin Robinson (1825-1894), Ann King Robinson Minturn (1827-1917), Rachael Robinson (1878-1919) and Robert F. Elmer, and Mary

IV. Ann King Papers

Quantity: 1 half-size and part of 1 half-size document box

Biographical Note

Ann King was born in 1786 in England, the daughter of Francis and Katherine King. She emigrated to the United States and in the first two decades of the nineteenth century she tuaght school, founding her own school in New York City with Maria Marriott (school was in operation in 1820). She had previously taught at the Quaker Nine Partners' School in Millbrook, New York, where she met Rowland T. and Rachel G. Robinson. From the 1820s to the 1850s she lived off and on with the Robinsons, contributing to the education of their children with whom she maintained an extensive correspondence whenever they were separated. After the death of Rachel G. Robinson in 1862, she moved permanently to the Robinson farm. Rowland T. Robinson had proposed marriage, but his children objected. Ann died in Ferrisburgh in 1867. Ann King was a devout Quaker and was widely known as an educator. She was interested in the same progressive causes as the Robinsons, including spiritualism. Her interests were wide ranging, extending from the natural and domestic sciences to history, to spiritualism.

Scope and Content

Ann King's papers consist primarily of material copied for her by her many students and acquaintances. There are also mss on birch bark in a hand that may be identified as Ann's, and cards relating to schools where she taught. Papers are arranged in nine folders plus bound volumes. The first three folders contain copies, primarily of verse, but include prose in several fields. Most are loose pages, but there are two hand-bound volumes. The fourth contains mss material relating to Ann. The fifth contains mss on thin birch bark, prose and verse. The sixth contains rate cards for two schools in New York City. The last two folders contain spirit communications. The bound volumes contain copies, clippings, accounts, and material relating to the New York Yearly Meeting and the Nine Partners' School.

IV. Rowland Thomas and Rachel Gilpin Robinson Papers

Biographical Note

Rowland Thomas Robinson was the only son of Thomas Richardson and Jemima Fish Robinson. He was born in Ferrisburgh, Vermont, on September 21, 1796. He attended a Quaker boarding school, Nine Partners' School, in Duchess County, New York. There he met Rachel Gilpin, a fellow student, whom he married in 1820, and Ann King, a teacher who became a close friend and member of the family. Robinson was a farmer and social activist. He raised Merino sheep and a variety of arable copys, as well as apples and pears. He also operated grist, saw, and fulling mills and, at one point, a nursery. He operated a school on the property for about seven years, 1839-1846. In the 1830s he was instrumental in founding the Vermont Anti-Slavery Society and was the chief abolitionist organizer in Vermont. He was an active member of the Hicksite sect of the Society of Friends, but left the Quaker meeting in 1846 in response to the New York Yearly Meeting's increasing reluctance to actively address the issue of slavery. During this period the farm became an active and well-documented stop on the Underground Railroad. He became Ferrisburgh town clerk in 1857, a position that remained in the family until 1960. He appears to have suffered from frequent periods of ill health, but lived to age 83, dying in Ferrisburgh on August 25, 1879.

Rachel Gilpin Robinson was born on October 1, 1799 in New York City to George and Rachel Starr Gilpin. Her grandfather was George Gilpin, an aide-de-camp to George Washington. She attended a Quaker borading school, Nine Partners' School in Duchess County, New York. It was there that she met Rowland Thomas Robinson; they were married in 1820 and moved to the farm of Rowland's parents, Thomas and Jemima Robinson in Ferrisburgh, Vermont. Her piety can be noted in both her early letters to Rowland, before their marriage, and in her letters from Martha Furnace, a Quaker rest home in southern New Jersey, in the 1830s. She was clerk of the Socity of Friends Women's Monthly Meeting in Ferrisburgh during the 1820s and 1830s. She appears to have suffered from chronic ill health most of her life. She stayed at Martha Furnace on at least two occasions and later took the water cure in Rochester, New York. The exact nature of her condition remains unclear, but may have been uterine cysts. She was devoted to progressive causes and sometimes annoyed her sons by her acceptance of African American domestic help in the house. She left the Society of Friends in 1846 because of its resistance to taking action against slavery. Rachel died in Ferrisburgh on January 3, 1862.

Scope and Content

The papers of Rowland Thomas and Rachel Gilpin Robinson are collected as loose papers in folders and as bound volumes. Rowland's papers are arranged in nine folders. Folders 2 and 3 consist of receipts and bills, the first dealing with family including Ann King, and farm, and the second dealing with the town of Ferrisburgh, Vermont. Folders 4, 5, and 6 contain printed material, primarily newspaper and periodical clippings, including an extensive correspondence on capital punishment and material from the Vermont legislature. Folders 7, 8, and 9 consist ofmanuscripts and typescripts, including photocopies. They cover a wide range of subjects: social, literary, and agricultural. Attribution of a few of the ms. copies is conjectural. The collection, while sketchy, reveals a wide range of subjects, interests and concerns. The bound volumes contain obituaries and newspaper clippings, indexed by Rachel G. Robinson. Some of Robinson's financial papers are housed in Box II:1, folders 12-17.

Rachel Gilpin Robinson's papers are arranged in three folders plus a bound volume. Folder in contains her 1831 journal from her visit to Martha Furnace. Folders 2 and 3 consist of printed material: clippings on practical and domestic matters and hyms. The bound volume, dated 1817, contains copied verse and prose, as well as a list of books she owned.

Biographical Note

Rowland Evans Robinson (1833-1900) was a naturalist, farmer, commercial artist, illustrator, and author of many works portrayin glife in early Vermont. He became one of Vermont's best-known and loved writers and captured the country life of earlier days both in colorful stories and in hundreds of illustrations. Robinson was perhaps the best-known member of a remarkable Quaker family of farmers, artists, writers, and social activists. He was born at Rokeby, the family home in Ferrisburgh, Vermont, the son of Rowland Thomas and Rachel Gilpin Robinson. Robinson began his artistic career in the 1850s when he moved to New York City to study engraving. He began selling his drawings of farm and outdoor life to many of the agricultural and sporting magazines of the day. Extended stays in New York to pursue his artistic career continued throughout the 1870s, with regular returns home. During his father's illness in 1869, he became close to Ann Stevens, his father's nurse (and his second cousin), and they married in 1870. They settled at Rokeby and had three children, Rachael (b. 1878), Rowland (Rowlie) (b. 1882), and Mary (b. 1884). After many years as an artist, illustrator, and farmer, Robinson's eyesight began to fail and, by 1893, he was completely blind. With the help of his wife, he turned to writing and in a short time becamse a much-loved author of Vermont tales and essays on its natural history. He wrote several collections of short stories and was a regular contributor for several years to Forest and Stream. Beginning in the 1880s, his works were published in a total of fourteen book-length volumes. Robinson' written works fall into three major categories: nature writings, stories, and history. The nature writings describe the flora, fauna, geography, and geology of the Champlain Valley. They were widely published both in magazine articles and in collected works such as In New England Field and Woods, published in 1896. The stories center around the lives of the residents of the fictional community of Danvis, Vermont. Many of his characters speak in dialect: Yankee, Quaker plain English, French-Canadian English, Southern English. His stories are especially notable for his skill at capturing the sound of the language, the nuances of speech, and the humor and flavor of nineteenth-century everyday life. These works were published beginning in 1887 and continued to be published even after his death in 1900. The third area of his writings, history, is represented by Vermont: A Study in Independence, written for the American Commonwealth Series in 1892. Robinson died after a long fight with on October 15, 900, at Rokeby in the room where he had been born. The Rowland Evans Robinson Memorial Association was formed in 1937 to keen his works and memory alive

Ann (Anna) Stevens Robinson was born on August 25, 1841 in East Montpelier, the daughter of Stephen F. and Rachel Byrd Stevens. She was tutored at home with her siblings until age sixteen. She attended People's Academy in Morrisville and later obtained a scholarship to Glenwood Seminary in West Brattleboro, Vermont. After her graduation from Glenwood, she stayed on as a teacher of Latin, mathematics, and history. She was a proficient painter. She married Rowland Evans Robinson on July 25, 1870. They had three children, Rachel (b. 1878), Rowland (Rowlie) (b. 1882), and Mary (b. 1884). After her husband became blind, she encouraged him to write. Besides managing the family farm, carrying on the town clerk's work, and reading to her husband several hours each day, Anna also corrected her husband's manuscripts and prepared them for publication. She died on August 2,1920.

Scope and Content

Rowland E. Robinson's papers are collected both in bound volumes and as loose papers. The bound volumes (or, more properly, notebooks) consist of his personal diaries, his daily observations of the natural world, his notes on the history of Ferrisburgh and Vermont, and ledgers of his living expenses during his stays in New York and at Rokeby. The loose papers include published notices and reviews of his books as well as other clippings related to his wrirings. Contracts, financial statements, receipts, agreements, and other financial records with his publishers are organized by publisher. Miscellaneous schoolwork, notes on the Abenaki dialect, enlistment rolls from the Vermont Regiment, and newspaper

obituaries written at the time of his death are also included in the collection. Ann Stevens Robinson's papers include various writings, both published and unpublished; receipts and other miscellaneous documents; schoolwork; numerous scrapbooks, diaries, and other albums.

Biograhical Note

Rowland Thomas Robinson, "Rowlie," (1882-1951) was the son of Rowland Evans and Ann Stevens Robinson. He attended Goddard Seminary and the University of Vermoint. Rowlie was Ferrisburgh town cleark, a member of the Vergennes City Band, and represnetated Ferrisburgh in the Vermont legislature. He operated the family dairy farm and married Elizabeth Donoway in 1907. They had no children. Rowlie's account books and diaries are in this collection.

Elizabeth Donoway Robinson (1882-1961) of Vergennes, Vermont, was the wife of Rowland Thomas, "Rowlie," Robinson. Following their marriage in 1907, she lived at Rokeby for the rest of her life, served as Ferrisburgh town clerk, helped manage the farm and tourist-boarding business. They had no children. She was instrumental in the life of the Rowland E. Robinson Memorial Association, which, upon her death, managed the museum that is Rokeby today. Elizabeth's household inventory and receipts, miscellaneous notes and scrapbooks are in this collection.

Biographical Note

Ann Stevens Robinson (1841-1920), wife of Rowland Evans Robinson, was the daughter of Stephen Foster Stevens (1799-1858) and Rachel Byrd Stevens (1804-1868) of Montpelier, Vermont. Rachel Byrd was the niece of Thomas and Jemima Robinson, who first settled at Rokeby. The parents of Stephen Foster were Clark (1764-1853) and Huldah Foster Stevens (1766-1845). Clark Stevens served in the Revolutionary War, became a Quaker, and was an early settler of Montpelier. Stephen Foster Stevens was a cabinetmaker and had a shop in Monkton for a time. Some of his furniture is in the collection at Rokeby. He and his wife had six children.
